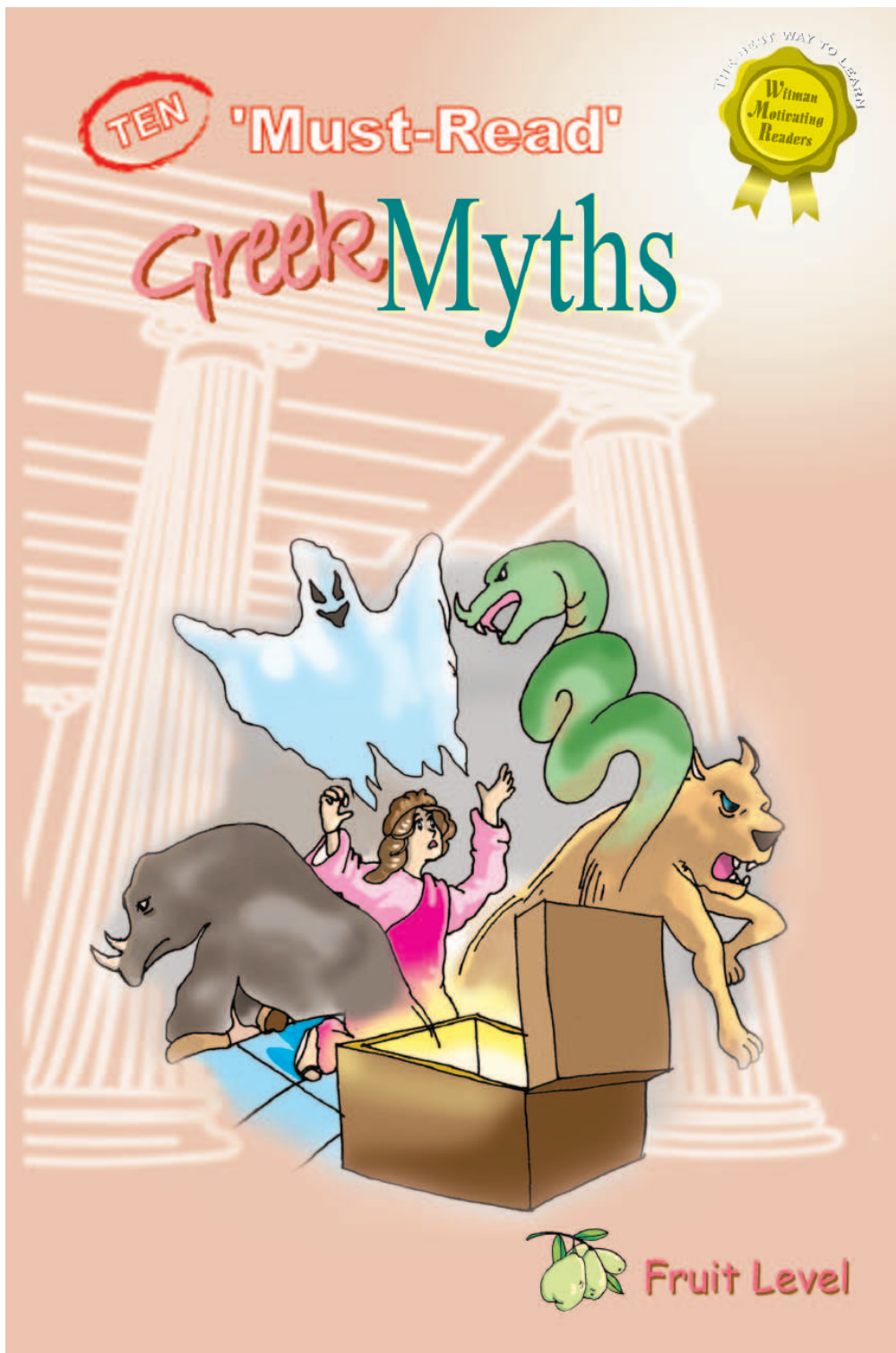


Answers for Fun Activities



MYTH 1 — Pandora's Box (Student's book page 7)

Suggested answer:

Once I told one of my friends about the bad things that another friend said about him. The first friend got very angry with the second friend, and then they both got very angry with me. It would have been better for all of us if I hadn't said anything. From now on, I'm going to keep things like that a secret.

Writing Activity

4. What do you think the creatures did after they left Pandora's box? Write a paragraph describing what one of the creatures did after it escaped.

Suggested answer:

Once Anger got out of the box, it couldn't wait to start ruining people's lives. It went into houses and made mothers angry with fathers, and siblings angry at each other. It went to visit Kings, and made countries mad at other countries and wanting to go to war. It even visited people who were alone, and made them angry with themselves. Everywhere Anger went, it made things worse than they had been.

Speaking Activity

Suggested answer:

I would also be able to do things for my friends and family with my wishes. The only problem is that Dionysus might think asking for more wishes was cheating.

Writing Activity

- Write a myth similar to The Midas Touch. Create a character that makes a wish and gets it. The wish should seem like a good thing at first, but in the end, it should turn out to cause problems.

Suggested answer:

A man found a bottle on the beach, and when he pulled out the cork, a genie granted him a wish. The man said he wanted to stay young forever, and the genie granted him his wish. The man was very happy for a while, because he never got older. But as the years went by, he realised that not aging was a curse. All the people he loved got older and died, but the man never changed. He realised that staying young forever meant spending forever alone.

Speaking Activity

Suggested answer:

First, Athena showed the tapestry that she had created. We were amazed at how beautiful it was. We didn't think Arachne could possibly do any better. Then Arachne showed what she had woven. It was very good, but it made fun of the gods. I think Athena was very insulted.

Writing Activity

4. Athena was the goddess of war, wisdom and weaving. If you were a god or goddess, what would you control? In 50-60 words, describe what you would be the god or goddess of, and why.

Suggested answer:

If I could be a god, I would be the god of peace. War is a terrible thing, and if there is already a god of war (as many people believe), then the world needs a god of peace. I would stop nations from fighting whenever I saw them, and I would reward countries that solved their disagreements peacefully.

Suggested answer:

Head 3 : I think we should try to talk to him.

Head 4 : No, let's sneak up on him when he isn't looking!

Writing Activity

5. Pretend you are Heracles. Write a short letter to your mother, Alcmene, describing how you killed the Lion of Nemea or the Hydra. Write about one paragraph.

Suggested answer:

Dear mom,

As you probably know, I killed the Hydra, but it wasn't easy. Every time I cut off one of its heads, two new ones would grow in its place. Luckily, Iolaus was with me. I had him shoot a burning arrow into each neck after I cut off the first head. Soon, the Hydra only had one head left. I used a big rock to trap that head where it can't hurt anyone again.

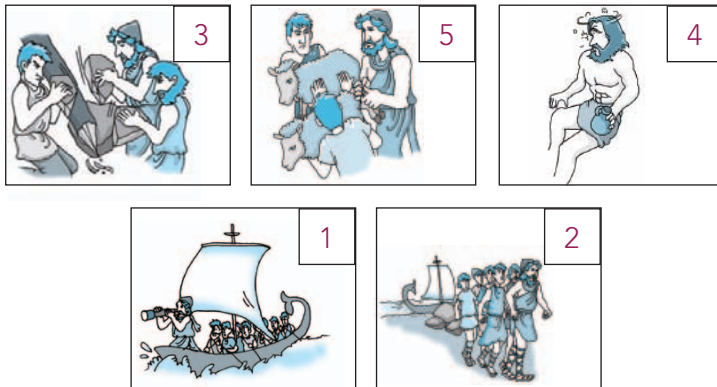
MYTH 7 — Odysseus' Adventures

I would have told him that we would be happy to share our wine in return for his hospitality.

5. What do you think happened to Odysseus and his crew after they escaped from the island of the Cyclopes? Write a short story describing what happened.

Suggested answer:

After *Odysseus* and his men escaped from the island, they travelled for a long time. Once, their ship was lost in a storm, but Odysseus was able to use the stars to figure out where they were. Another time, they went ashore in Africa, where they met unusual people and saw many strange creatures. It was just one of the many adventures they had during their long journey back to Greece.

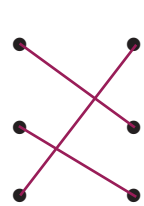
